A short refresher on the Synoptic Gospels


Matthew, Mark, and Luke contain large tracts of similar (sometimes identical) material – so similar, in fact, that they are called the Synoptic Gospels – the prefix *syn* meaning 'together'.

Virtually all mainstream scholars believe that Mark was written first, sometime in the mid to late 60's (about 35 after Jesus' time), and that Matthew was written sometime around the year 80, with Luke a few years later, around 85. (John was probably written in the 90's – although it has very little in common with the other three.)

None of the gospel writers were eyewitnesses to Jesus' ministry, so they got their information from other sources.* Mark *may* have been partially influenced by Paul's writings. It's widely accepted that both Matthew and Luke independently used parts of Mark. A smaller majority of scholars also believe that both Matthew and Luke used a now-lost collection of Jesus' sayings commonly called Q. (The full name is *Quelle*, after the German word for 'Source.')

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The basic situation can be diagrammed in this way:



There are still many differing concerns and arguments regarding the details, but for the better part of a century a majority of mainstream biblical scholars have regarded this as the general solution to what they call the 'Synoptic Problem' (Which isn't really a *problem* as much as a *puzzle*.)

Notice, though, that in addition to Mark and Q there are two other sources of material used by Matthew and Luke. Small sections, neither from Mark or Q, are found only in Matthew and only Luke, and are simply called M and L. Matthew and Luke's nativity narratives are both from M and L respectively – and the story of Zaccheus is also from L.

^{*} It's not directly related to today's topic, but it's very likely that none of the Gospel writers were actually named Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. The gospels circulated for the better part of a century before names were attributed to them, sometime in the second century.
